• The chapter commences by informing us that "Everything has its own time, and there is a specific time for every activity under heaven:" (God's Word **Translation**) This is described by commentators as the thesis statement of the chapter. This informs us that no matter what happens around us or with us, time is ascribed to it all.

Ellicott's Commentary for English Readers

(1) A season.--The word is only found in later Hebrew (Nehemiah 2:6; Esther 9:27; Esther 9:31), and in the Chaldee of Daniel and Ezra.

• **Purpose.**--The use of the word here and in Ecclesiastes 3:17; Ecclesiastes 5:8; Ecclesiastes 8:6, in the general sense of "a matter," belongs to later Hebrew. The primary meaning of the word is "pleasure" or "desire," and it is so used in this book (Ecclesiastes 5:4; Ecclesiastes 12:1; Ecclesiastes 12:10).

- To every *thing there is* a {a} season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven:
- (a) He speaks of this diversity of time for two causes first to declare that there is nothing in this world perpetual: next to teach us not to be grieved, if we have not all things at once according to our desires, neither enjoy them so long as we would wish. (Geneva Study Bible)

- Each season carries a particular characteristic that differentiates it from the next.

- He begins at the beginning with the 'spills' which describes a child and the many challenges one has as an infant. He ends with the 'wills' which describes the end of life or ending where one prepares for a departure from life.
- There are similarities between what is Solomon looks at in Ecclesiastes 3 and Richard Needham 'Ages of Man/Life'.

- It's difficult for us as human beings to fully grasp all of God's plan (Romans 8:28).
 This is where the **pain** registers in our experiences in our walk with God when we go through our <u>seasons</u>.
- God hears us without a doubt. His word says our prayers are stored in "golden bowls" Revelations 5:8. However his response though sometimes hard to fathom is His way to get us to focus on Him and not on our situations.
